2. Introduction

CADFA came into being during 2004. From a small ad hoc group it has gone from strength to strength; the name Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association was adopted at an inaugural meal in October 2004, and its constitution was adopted in June 2005. This first annual report has been prepared to cover the year since the adoption of the constitution (June 2005 to June 2006) but also refers to the initial period as this was not covered by an annual report.

The financial year of CADFA runs from 1st April to 31st March each year and those are the dates of the accounts included here. Fundraising and expenses since that time are discussed but figures post April 2005 will be included in the next annual report.

3. CADFA's Objects - From the constitution adopted on 21st June 2005:

CADFA's objects are to promote human rights (as set out in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and subsequent United Nations conventions and declarations) and respect for international humanitarian law in the area of Abu Dis, a region of Palestine, by all or any of the following means:

- Raising awareness of human rights and humanitarian issues relevant to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict in general and to the situation of Abu Dis in particular;
- Researching and monitoring abuses of human rights and infringements of humanitarian law in Abu Dis;
- Educating the public about human rights and humanitarian law;
- Promoting public support for human rights and the observance of humanitarian law;
- Working to eliminate abuses of human rights and infringements of humanitarian law in Abu Dis;
- Working to obtain and promote redress for the victims of human rights abuses and infringements of humanitarian law in Abu Dis and their families;
- Providing support to and relieving need among the victims of human rights abuses and infringements of humanitarian law and their families, in Abu Dis.

4. What is Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association (CADFA) trying to do?

Promoting human rights and respect for international humanitarian law in Abu Dis, Palestine.

Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association is a Camden organisation dedicated to promoting human rights in Abu Dis. Along with others in Palestine, people in Abu Dis suffer abuses of human rights as a result of the Israeli occupation and its practices, for example the construction of the Separation Wall. We are promoting friendship links and twinning not as an end in itself but because we believe this is an effective way to draw the human rights situation in Abu Dis to the attention of people in Camden and to work with others locally to do something about it.

Hundreds of people in Camden have signed our friendship statement, which says:

We are building friendship links with a view to twinning for these reasons:

- In order to express solidarity and common humanity with people in Abu Dis in their time of need
- So people from both communities can learn more about each other, to help build friendship and understanding
- So people in Camden can deepen their understanding of what is happening in this troubled part of the world
- So we can support practical projects such as medical and educational projects in Abu Dis.

5. Human rights

The situation in Abu Dis and in Palestine in relation to international humanitarian law and human rights is very grave. In the background – and affecting Palestine as a whole - this year have been the extension of the Wall despite the opinion given by the International Court of Justice, the extension of settlements including Maale Adumim, the build-up to the Palestinian election which was finally held in January 2006, and pressures on the PA following the election of Hamas in January 2006, the attack on the Jericho Jail (February 2006) prior to the Israeli election of March 2006, the Israeli government's plan to annexe great areas of the West Bank including the Jordan Valley and the main settlement blocks. In order to be brief, main issues for people in Abu Dis are listed below.

Main issues in Abu Dis

Israeli occupation, mistreatment of people by the army

Settlement construction, illegal under international law
Land confiscation to expand the big settlement of Maale Adumim continuing

Refugees (both to Abu Dis and from Abu Dis) not allowed to return to their place of origin

Israeli annexation of East Jerusalem, Judaisation of Jerusalem, pressures on Palestinians with blue passes – threat of removal of the passes

Disruption to life caused by checkpoints, curfews, arrests etc. Pass laws restricting movement of people with green and orange passes

Families separated by the Wall and the pass laws

Dismissal of people working in Jerusalem but based in the rest of the West Bank, sector by sector – teachers, health workers

Great difficulties for students at Al Quds university from checkpoints making them seriously late, etc. An increase in incidents at the time of university exams including night-time raids by the army, girls being told they will be strip-searched at checkpoints, refusing and not reaching exams

The Separation Wall that cuts through Abu Dis and separates it from Jerusalem – serious loss of jobs and lack of access to services including the hospitals

Political prisoners, prisoners held without trial, mistreatment of prisoners, child prisoners

During 2005-6 – local to Abu Dis

Solicitor Ali Abu Hilal arrested at a meeting of teachers in Jerusalem

Attack on Jericho Jail (20 km from Abu Dis)

Results of Palestinian general election not recognised, Palestinian Authority not allowed money by the West, consequent increase in poverty

PA representatives arrested by the Israeli Authority, Jerusalem ones with blue passes removed

Many arrests by the army in Abu Dis including of school children

Families of prisoners denied the right to visit them

More severe closure of the western side of the wall – Permits to get to Jerusalem increasingly hard to get – People who had had permits denied entry

Many people in ambulances prevented from getting to the hospital

Wall on east side of Abu Dis begins – new checkpoint in Alazzariyeh

In May, the local PA court (just after being painted and having had new computers installed) was moved out of the area. Local people suspected that the Jerusalem suburb was being seen by Israel as an area that in future would not be a Palestinian Authority area. The area remained under the control of the Israeli soldiers.

Shehadeh Ahmed Mohsen, diabetic patient from Al Muqassed Hospital, and with a permit to go for an appointment, denied a way through the checkpoint and killed by Israeli soldiers on his way to the hospital

CADFA activity on these issues

CADFA has explained the importance of some of these issues in the report of the April 05 visit and in a leaflet on the Separation Wall produced by the Human Rights links group and plan further leaflets in 2006-7

We have given out information at all of our events (below)

We are developing an “activity tree” to help us respond to cries of help from Abu Dis

We launched a letter-writing campaign and liaised with Amnesty International when Lawyer Ali Abu Hilal was arrested

We now put current news sent from Abu Dis on the website

At the end of the year we were able to employ a co-ordinator in Abu Dis whose job includes monitoring and reporting on the situation in relation to human rights, so we plan to have a monthly report during 2006-7

We have discussed the idea of people in Camden adopting separated families and child prisoners, and hope to put this into action during 2006-7

6. Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association – the first steps

December 2003	Meeting held in Camden exploring the purpose and the possibility of establishing friendship links with a town in Palestine – and discussing which town it might be.
January 2004	First Camden-Abu Dis links established. Statements from various organisations in Camden were faxed to Camden, and contact established by email.
April 2004	Sponsored walk in Camden to raise money for the Faisal al-Husseiny Clinic This was used to start the Camden Eye Clinic.
April 2004	A Camden friend visited Abu Dis and came back with a proposal to raise money for a community centre.
October 2004	Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association was formally set up at a fund-raising meal to raise money for the community centre. Julie Christie, Ken Loach and Ahdaf Soueif were there.
October 2004	The first links groups were set up to strengthen the organisation in Camden by encouraging people to raise the issue of Palestine and Abu Dis within their own areas of work or interest.
April 2005	First Camden group visit to Abu Dis. This gave the work in Camden a great push forward, and led to lots of talks, exhibitions and meetings within Camden.
June 2005	CADFA was re-constituted as a charitable trust.
September 2005	First Abu Dis delegation to Camden included visits to many organisations and also the first British Twinning with Palestine conference, bringing together groups from across Britain who were seeking to make links to Palestinian towns.

November 2005	Second Camden group visit to Abu Dis also linked people from some other areas in Britain to new partners in Palestine.
Nov-Dec 05	First CADFA volunteer from Camden teaching English in Abu Dis.
13 th January 06	CADFA granted charitable status (charity number 1112717)
February 06	Several projects completed in Abu Dis – internet connections to schools, computers for women’s internet café, restoration of Friendship House, money given for cheap medicines via Al-Muqassed Society.
March 06	Women’s delegation from Abu Dis to Camden took part in International Women’s Day celebrations and visited schools, colleges, clinics and hospitals. Children’s club starts in Abu Dis at Friendship House, and staffed by Camden volunteers
April 06	Third group visit to Abu Dis coincided with Twinning Network visit and British Palestinian Friendship Conference in Bethlehem Formal opening of the Friendship House in Abu Dis
June 06	Visit to Camden by a group of young people and teachers, to meet young people in Camden schools and youth clubs. Health links concert raised money for basic medicines in Abu Dis.
June-July 06	Fundraising for summer camp (summer scheme) for children in Abu Dis. Volunteers from Camden preparing to go to help with the summer camp and with English course and computer course for women at the Friendship House.

7. Organisation of CADFA

Trustees, officers and general meetings

CADFA is organised as a charitable trust which allows us to inform the public as well as to raise funds for practical projects. We have to be clear who are the people to take the decisions in the organisation, so we have a formal membership for which we charge a small amount per year. The rules of CADFA are written in the constitution adopted in June 2005. This governs the election of officers etc.

Links groups and open meetings

However, we want to include as many people as we can in our activities, and we have open meetings once a month. Anyone sympathetic to our aims is welcome to come and take part.

Much of the practical work of CADFA is done through links groups, which work on particular areas such as education, health, women, youth, unions... . The different links groups work in different ways, each deciding on their own projects but keeping in close touch with the CADFA trustees and reporting to the open meetings each month. Each links group is asked to work with both sides – Camden and Abu Dis. In Camden, the work is to extend awareness of human rights and humanitarian issues relevant to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict and to the situation of Abu Dis in particular within the area of the links group. For example, the education links group encourages teachers, governors, lecturers to take an interest in the education and human rights situation in Abu Dis. Together with people in Abu Dis, the work is to develop useful projects – so, for example, the community links group has raised money for a community centre in Abu Dis. .

Of course many of the projects will help more than one links group, and directly serve the aims of CADFA as a whole. For example, the women's links group organised a visit of women from Abu Dis to Camden, which was also be useful for the other links groups (in this case, health, education, student and human rights links) – and in its turn the children's visit organised by the education links group has been helpful to the women's links and the youth links group. In open meetings, people work together to push forward the understanding in Camden of the human rights situation in Abu Dis and the number of people wanting to be active in doing something about it.

The links groups produce their own events and leaflets etc and also promote the general CADFA literature To date, each links group has set off on its own fundraising for its projects, but as CADFA gets bigger and incurs more expenses, we wonder if it would be useful to have a fundraising sub-group to help the links groups and CADFA as a whole.

8. Communication

Email lists and ward reps

Communicating with supporters in Camden is very important and we do this mainly by email. As the numbers of supporters have spread into the hundreds we have cut down on expensive mailouts, but we know that relying on email cuts some people out and we are not happy about that. We have spent some time organising a system of ward representatives in each ward in Camden who can deliver things locally. By this end of the year, each ward in Camden has a named rep. who is willing to do occasional deliveries to our supporters in each ward, and also leaflets etc to community noticeboards and venues local to them. This is a system we are just beginning but hope to make it work well in the next year.

Updates (newsletters)

Every month or two we have made an update (a newsletter) with information about current activities. These are distributed by email and put on the website, and we hope that during the next year, these will be regularly delivered by ward reps to those of our supporters who are not on email.

Leaflets and posters

We have now got a series of leaflets with a similar format but different colours for the different links group themes, and these are being distributed via links groups and ward reps round the borough. We managed to get some of them, and a T-shirt and poster to promote CADFA, printed in Abu Dis itself which takes much-needed work there – and we will try and get future print-runs done there if possible.

We would very much like to thank Chris for setting up our website and more recently Frances for taking it over, improving it and keeping it updated daily. It is becoming a better and better resource for us, and we hear that it is used in Abu Dis as well. Friends there are working on Arabic pages and we hope to have a truly dual language website by this time next year.

9. Activities in Camden 2005-6

This has been an active first year for CADFA as a charitable trust and we can be proud of what we have achieved. The number of people involved in CADFA has grown steadily, partly because there are many ways to be involved. There have been a steady stream of Camden events of various sorts to inform the public and to raise funds for Abu Dis. We have had visits to Abu Dis and received delegations from Abu Dis. Although it seemed at first to be a struggle to get our work noticed in the local press, there has been an increasing interest, and at a recent Camden summer fair stall (with no connection to us or to Palestine) the CADFA name (painted on the top of a display screen) was repeatedly greeted with recognition by people who were passing by.

Visits to Abu Dis from Camden

The first group visit to Camden went in April 2005, and a report on this visit is available from CADFA. Two more group visits were organised during 05-06, in November 05 and in April 06. These visitors first went to Bethlehem, Ramallah, Jerusalem and Hebron to understand the Palestinian context and to meet organisations including the Israeli Committee Against House Demolitions and Al-Haq, and then for several days to Abu Dis, to stay with people, visit organisations and learn about the human rights situation in Abu Dis itself.

A number of individual visitors have also been to Abu Dis. In February 2006, the CADFA chair made a visit to finalise arrangements for a number of CADFA projects – the school internet connections, health projects and the Friendship House. In November, March and April, three volunteers went to

Abu Dis each for about a month, to teach English in the Al Quds university, the Jeel al-Jadeed School, the An Nur Centre, the FAMC Clinic and the Friendship House.

In the thirteen months including April 2005 and 2006, twenty-five Camden people visited Abu Dis. These visits are an important way of getting people to know about the issues, and those who have visited have been very struck by the experience. They have encouraged people on return to stay involved and help the work of CADFA. The voluntary work has been welcomed by people in Abu Dis. CADFA has not funded these visits at all, preferring to spend that money on people from Abu Dis to come here and each meet and speak to hundreds of people in Camden. We hope in the next year to encourage others to go and visit and maybe to volunteer, and we plan to organise themed visits for particular groups of people.

Visits to Camden from Abu Dis

During 2005-6, we have welcomed eighteen visitors from Abu Dis to Camden (and a ticket for a nineteenth was also bought but she was not allowed to cross the Allenby Bridge). The visitors were two doctors, a nurse, a human rights worker, a business man, a representative of the Al-Quds University, a university student, a teacher, two headteachers and four girls and four boys from Abu Dis Schools.

This was on three visits: a general visit in September 2005, a women's visit in March 2006, and a children's and teachers' visit in June 2006. These visits represented a fantastic amount of work fundraising and organising, but were tremendously useful.

During each visit, the Abu Dis visitors had a busy programme of meetings with Camden organisations, groups and individuals, and also at least one public meeting, which mean that by now thousands of people in Camden have listened to people in Abu Dis talking about their lives. From these events, many more people have become interested in human rights issues in connection with Abu Dis and Palestine and have got involved with the work of CADFA.

Following the visits, there has been more work to be done, contacting the organisations who met them and seeking to involved them in the links group work. Following the most ambitious of these visits – the children's visit – we are planning to put together a small book which can be given to all the schools in both Abu Dis and Camden.

We would like to thank all those Camden people who have actively helped with these visits by hosting, welcoming, meeting the visitors and by taking such an interest in what they had to say. From each visit, we have learned more about how to organise effective visits. A report on the children's visit is available from CADFA.

Projects in Abu Dis 2005-6

This year we were able to financially support the following projects in Abu Dis:

- The renovation of the Dar Assadaqa (Friendship House) community centre;
- Four computers to be the basis of an internet café for women;
- The installation of the internet into two schools in Abu Dis;
- and a data projector for one of the schools;
- the purchase of basic medicine for the Al-Muqassed clinic in Abu Dis
- in addition to the journeys to London of the people mentioned above.

We were able to support the following projects in other ways:

- Our Town photographic competition for young people in Abu Dis and Camden to contribute photographs and writing about the place they lived in
- We collected and circulated information about human rights abuses in Abu Dis. When Lawyer Ali Abu Hillal was arrested, we were able to get a number of letters written and call on Amnesty, and he was released the next day. When Jericho Jail was attacked, we wrote a letter to Jack Straw – though we did not get an answer. We circulate stories on our big email list, and have now also got an active website where we can put this information.

Co-ordinator in Abu Dis

At the end of the year we were able to appoint a local co-ordinator for CADFA work in Abu Dis in order to

- send CADFA regular reports on the human rights situation in Abu Dis
- promote the work CADFA is doing in Abu Dis
- ensure that representatives of as many Abu Dis people and organisations as possible are in touch with CADFA work
- liaise with the Abu Dis Camden Committee in Abu Dis
- where relevant, co ordinate projects we are developing there
- send us regular reports on what is happening to projects
- organise for CADFA visitors from Britain and explain about Abu Dis to them
- help Abu Dis people to prepare to visit Camden
- help with the Arabic part of the CADFA website

This post is for a year in the first instance, and will be reviewed in March 2007.

Twining Network

In September 2005, when our first group of Abu Dis visitors were in Camden, we hosted a conference of different groups across Britain who are making

This led to us becoming a founder-member of the Britain-Palestine Friendship Forum, a network of diverse groups who are promoting a variety of twinning activities. This work contributes to raising awareness of human rights and humanitarian issues relevant to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict in general. Within it we raise the issue of the situation of Abu Dis in particular through presentations on the work of CADFA at talks across Britain (Liverpool, Ludlow, Tower Hamlets and others about to happen, and at a second Twinning Network conference, in Bethlehem, in April 2006).

We must continue to work in this way, but we are at a different point from a year ago. We have now got good links to Abu Dis and interest in this project at both ends, as there are many people now who have visited the other place (Camden or Abu Dis) or who have been involved in one of our activities or projects. We have now got a co-ordinator in Abu Dis who is preparing reports for us on abuses of human rights and infringements of humanitarian law. We have a lot of material generated by people at both ends and in particular in Abu Dis. We have the links groups in a number of areas, and we have a lot of first contacts made with organisations in Camden.

This second year as a charity should be a time of using the information we have gathered and developing the links, and importantly of making more material that can be used to promote public support for human rights and the observance of humanitarian law.

Suggested priorities for 2006/7:

- (1) To have a human rights report from Abu Dis each month
- (2) To firm up our "tree" of responses to calls for help from Abu Dis
- (3) To make further leaflets on human rights issues, beginning with separated families and child prisoners
- (4) In Camden, the links groups to work with the links that have been made to extend interest in human rights and international humanitarian law in relation to Abu Dis and to Palestine, and to develop projects for Abu Dis.
- (5) In Camden, to try and firm up the tentative links that have been made through the visits and aim to have more organisations in Camden formally join CADFA.
- (6) Within Camden to make some links to the Muslim community
- (7) To organise some visits to Abu Dis, possibly to include themed visits such as a councillors' visit, a health visit, a teachers' visit.
- (8) To bring some visitors from Abu Dis and to reach further organisations in Camden. To bring at least one visitor in November at the time of the next Twinning with Palestine conference. To consider a musical visit or a drama visit.
- (9) To use the material from the children's visit and produce a booklet about Camden and Abu Dis in both English and Arabic. To promote this in Camden and to give it to schools in both places.
- (10) To conduct interviews in both places about 1967 and to produce material for the website and possibly a booklet about the effects on
