Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association (CADFA)

Who we are and what we do

Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association is a Camden organisation dedicated to promoting human rights in Abu Dis, a Palestinian town in the East Jerusalem suburb that is currently divided from Jerusalem by the Separation Wall. Along with others in Palestine, people in Abu Dis suffer abuses of human rights as a result of the illegal Israeli occupation and its practices, for example the construction of the Wall. We are promoting friendship links and twinning because we believe this is an effective way to draw the human rights situation in Abu Dis to the attention of people in Camden and to work with others locally to do something about it.

CADFA came into being during 2004, was constituted as a charity in June 2005 and got recognition as a charity in January 2006. In its first four or five years, CADFA has grown very strongly for a small organisation.

Our work falls into four main areas:

- Visits and volunteers
- Information: public meetings, publications and the website
- Links groups and projects with Abu Dis
- Campaign work including urgent actions

We hope you will look at our website for more information about our work – it is often updated. www.camdenabudis.net

CADFA's objects

are to promote human rights (as set out in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and subsequent United Nations conventions and declarations) and respect for international humanitarian law in the area of Abu Dis, a region of Palestine, by all or any of the following means:

- Raising awareness of human rights and humanitarian issues relevant to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict in general and to the situation of Abu Dis in particular;
- Researching and monitoring abuses of human rights and infringements of humanitarian law in Abu Dis;
- Educating the public about human rights and humanitarian law;
- Promoting public support for human rights and the observance of humanitarian law;
- Working to eliminate abuses of human rights and infringements of humanitarian law in Abu Dis;
- Working to obtain and promote redress for the victims of human rights abuses and infringements of humanitarian law in Abu Dis and their families;
- Providing support to and relieving need among the victims of human rights abuses and infringements of humanitarian law and their families, in Abu Dis.

CADFA achievements 2008-9

The first CADFA conference

We held our first conference in April 2008, with keynote speeches from Prof Manuel Hassassian (Palestinian ambassador), Baroness Jenny Tonge (who has seen some of our work in Palestine as well as Britain), Amjad Taha from Nakba 60, and film of our work as well as a number of workshops. This was a very useful occasion which informed participants about the situation in Abu Dis and about the many CADFA activities and motivated and prepared us for another busy year.

Voices from Abu Dis

We were proud to produce a second book, published on Human Rights Day. "Voices from Abu Dis¹" is a testament to the hard work we have been doing with the people of Abu Dis in the past four or five years, and has been well-received. The book includes Abu Dis people's stories of experiences of human rights violations and also maps, resources and commentary intended to be useful for education and human rights campaigning.

Education links and school twinning

This year saw strong development in the links between Abu Dis and Camden schools. The first Abu Dis teachers' visit to Camden schools in October 2008 built upon the work done by the Camden teachers' visit in 2007 and the visits of Abu Dis school children each year since 2006. Plans were made too for the second visit of Camden teachers to Abu Dis schools: a visit organised by CADFA with the British Council and education authorities at both ends.

Four pairs of Camden and Abu Dis schools have decided to make formal twinning links:

- Hampstead – Abu Dis Boys
- South Camden – Abu Dis UNRWA School
- Maria Fidelis – Abu Dis UNRWA School
- Edith Neville – Abu Dis Elementary School

These links have been supported by CADFA in many ways: we have provided resources, information, trouble-shooting, encouragement and advice at both ends, helped with communication, translation, the installation of the internet at Abu Dis Boys' and with English language support for the staff there; made an education newsletter for teachers in both places in English and Arabic each term, and been involved in talks and special events in schools at both ends.

Abu Dis youth films

During this year we raised money for a training course for young people in order for them to learn to make short films about their lives. This was organised in Dar Assadaqa Community Centre and led by Anis Barghouthi of the Young Filmmakers' Project in Palestine. It was a great experience for the young people involved, and the two films that were made – "The New Map of Abu Dis" (based on a story by one of the Dar Assadaqa women's committee) and "The Great Wall of Palestine" (presenting the Separation Wall in an ironic way as one of the wonders of the world)- have now been shown several times in Camden

Dar Assadaqa, Abu Dis

We have continued to support and work closely with the Dar Assadaqa (Friendship House) Community Centre in Abu Dis. During this year, the project moved to a bigger building in order to house the number of classes and groups which are making it one of the most lively places in Abu Dis. CADFA support a music teacher there, encourage the dabkeh and drama groups, send volunteers for the English classes and youth summer camps. The CADFA co-ordinator in Abu Dis uses the centre as a base for information meetings with CADFA visitors and other groups about the human rights situation in the local area.

Youth visit 2008

Summer 2008 saw the results of another big fundraising project, and we were able to bring our third group of Abu Dis youngsters to meet Camden youngsters. This year, the group were all girls

from the UNRWA School who had been working with the CADFA music teacher, and they sang Palestinian songs in schools and youth clubs across Camden. Their visit included a public meeting about Palestinian refugees and a fundraising concert in a local church. A group of Camden school students were involved in the visit as special buddies to the Palestinian young people, and in the months following, they have continued to meet and to work towards another visit, which will happen in summer 2009.

Music visit 2009

We are excited by the music developments that CADFA has enabled in both Camden and Abu Dis, which show our aim to work together in respect for each other's traditions and creativity. The CADFA music teacher has continued to work in Abu Dis, and this year has seen two visits of Abu Dis musicians to Camden: the young people in the summer, who came with Ahmed Eriqat, oud; and a visit in February of the "Camden Band" (Dr Abdullah Abu Hilal, voice, Rajai Ayyad, nye, Fadi Rumman, keyboard) The band played to great acclaim in Rosslyn Hill Chapel, Camden, and also in concerts in Lewisham, Southampton and Bristol. This also helped us to encourage other groups to develop twinning links with places in Palestine as a way of focusing on human rights issues.

In Camden, meanwhile, the "Saddaqa Trio" have been joined by others who are interested in using music to raise the profile of the human rights issue.

Health money for Gaza

This year, a new 24-hours emergency health centre was opened at the Al Muqassad Clinic in Abu Dis. The Camden Clinic was opened two years ago with the help of CADFA originally mainly to provide emergency services which had been cut off by the Separation Wall. The Clinic continues to be useful and is run through the co-operation of doctors with different specialisms. This clinic helps people in need of these specialisms and also people without Palestinian health insurance. This year, this work has enabled the doctors working there to raise some much-needed money for medicines for people who need it. The doctors at the Camden Clinic are particularly keen to open a diabetic clinic there when enough money has been raised, because owing to diet and high levels of stress, diabetes is a major disease in Palestine.

This year, however, the main focus of CADFA's fund-raising for health has been to raise money for relief in Gaza, during and after the Israeli war on the Gaza Strip in December- January. Through appeals and the fundraising concerts, CADFA raised over £3,700 of which £748 to Medical Aid for Palestinians (from the Lewisham concert) and all the rest was sent to Gaza via the Abu Dis Committee to support Gaza, which bought medicines from Palestinian medicine companies in Birzeit and sent them to Gaza with Palestinian Health Relief.

Women's links

The Camden women's links group has strengthened this year and has worked together with the Calthorpe Centre in King's Cross. The group maintained contact with the women's group at Dar Assadaqa in Abu Dis and raised some money to develop the garden and children's playspace there.

A small women's visit from Camden went to Abu Dis in May 2009, and their visit to women's centres across the West Bank was co-ordinated by the Dar Assadaqa Women's Group, which is now taking a bigger role in welcoming and guiding visitors to Abu Dis.

CADFA organised a wonderful women's visit (11 women) from Palestine to Britain in March 2009 which took women across the country on a speaking tour of many towns - from Brighton to Newcastle and Bristol to Cambridge. The high point of the Camden part of the tour was an International Women's Day event, held at the same time in Abu Dis and Camden. Among many other activities in each place, there was an opportunity for groups of women at each end to use a Skype link to communicate directly with each other.

Links to the Al Quds University in Abu Dis.

CADFA continued to work with the lecturers and students at Al Quds university in a number of ways, taking visitors there regularly, sending volunteers to help teach English and work in the humanitarian law centre.

Student links between Camden students' unions and the union at Al Quds University, Abu Dis, developed well during this year. CADFA uses its good links at both ends to support and help the unions to maintain contact, particularly over the ends of the academic years when the student groups change. The visits that CADFA organises and the meetings at the Camden universities are also important in building interest; in the November 2008 visit, three students were among the Palestinian visitors and in the March 2009 women's visit, four students including two from Al Quds in Abu Dis. This year, a second student union (at UCL) joined the student union at SOAS in making formal twinning links with the student union at Al Quds University.

Visits and volunteers to Abu Dis

Organising visits from Palestine to Britain and in the other direction is very time-consuming both in fund-raising and in organising and supporting the visits, but such visits are a very useful way of moving forward understanding in Britain of the human rights situation in Palestine and encouraging involvement in our work by all sorts of people. We have therefore worked very hard on this, and during 2008-9 organised the following visits:

To Palestine:

- women's visit, May 08;
- summer visit, July-August 08;
- twinning visit, November 08
- In addition, we organised visits and arranged tours and information sessions for a number of individual visitors to Abu Dis.

To Britain:

- youth visit, June 08
- teachers' visit, October 09,
- twinning visit touring Britain, November 08,
- music visit, February 09,
- women's visit touring Britain, March 09,
- planning visit for summer youth project, March 09

We have also continued to find and work with volunteers to come to Abu Dis throughout the school year (usually in three-month blocks) and during the summer youth camp (more volunteers and usually for weeks rather than months). This year the volunteers were largely working in English-language teaching but there was also input to the law school at the Al Quds University and to various youth activities. The volunteers contributed to support CADFA projects at the Abu Dis end, helping for example with communication between the women's groups at both ends, and the communication between linked schools.

Campaign work and urgent actions

We produce monthly reports of human rights violations in Abu Dis in both English and Arabic. We take up particular issues and individual cases through a variety of means – writing to our representatives in parliament and the European parliament, organising letter-writing to the Israeli authorities, trying to highlight issues through events and street protests. We have continued to focus on the issue of mass imprisonment and continue our child prisoner adoption scheme. We have taken up the case centrally of particular prisoners including Mohammed Saleh Mohsen who is extremely ill and not allowed family visits, and Mohammed Hassan Eriqat, a child who was shot by the army and arrested.

We are often greeted with no reply when we raise urgent action issues with the Israeli authorities, but we were pleased that this year the block on the travel of our co-ordinator was lifted after hundreds of letters had been written by CADFA supporters to the Israeli Embassy. The intervention of an MEP in response to our letter enabled the family of Mohammed Hassan Eriqat to visit him – after a month.

As well as raising it with our representatives, we did a number of “die-in” events in Camden in January and February in relation to the war on Gaza and asked people to write letters raising the question of human rights and the EU- Israel Trade Agreement (see below)

Website and communication.

We continue to put effort into our website, and to this are now added a Facebook group, cards, a calendar (this year with an education links theme), and new leaflets on issues including settlements, Gaza, environment and refugees. We provide regular updates for a big mailing list and also for our local representatives at council, MP and MEP level. We note that our name appears to be known and respected by a growing number of people at both ends, and this year we have provided speakers for local organisations including schools and colleges, national organisations including trade unions and for twinning groups in other parts of the country.

Work with other groups and the Twinning Network

Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association continue to play an active part in the Britain Palestine Twinning Network and to co-operate with other twinning groups both in Britain and in Palestine. This year we have run two visits to Palestine and two visits to Britain on behalf of the Network, visited twinning groups across Palestine at other times, helped to organise the national twinning conference in Camden in November 08, made preparations for the Palestinian national twinning conference in Abu Dis in April 09. We are committed to helping new groups to develop and have sent speakers on twinning to other places including Liverpool and Newcastle.

Fundraising and special events

Fundraising has unfortunately had to be a main preoccupation this year. Sometimes people think (because we do so much) that we are bigger than we are. We have no main sponsor or stable source of funding. We try to raise money from a variety of sources – appeals, sales, funding bids etc, and this year we have had successes and disappointments. Among our successes have been a grant from the Barry Amiel and Norman Melburn Trust for our human rights work and one from the European Union (Youth in Action 3.1) for our fourth youth visit which will be in summer 2009. However, we remain vulnerable and very much in need of financial help, and are looking hard for good ideas and active help that will enable us to keep going.

Thank you

As well as efforts that we made ourselves, this year we want to thank a number of individuals and groups who have organised fundraising activities for us, among them a group of women in Hertfordshire who organised a games night to raise money for the youth visit, the Camden “buddies” who ran a table-top sale, Nita Dhinsa who ran the Paris half-marathon, Sisters United UK who had a fundraising ball for CADFA, and several fundraising events at Hampstead School.

Human rights context 2008-9

Sixty years of human rights

2008 was for the people of Palestine the sixtieth anniversary of the Nakba when many were made to leave their homes in the part of Palestine that then became Israel. It was also the sixtieth anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Unfortunately during this year, the urgency of defending the human rights of people in Abu Dis and Palestine has been underlined by a number of serious developments to which CADFA has responded in a number of ways.

Violations of human rights in Abu Dis

The CADFA human rights reports that we put on our website every month in English and Arabic (see www.camdenabudis.net/humanrightsreports) tell a continuing story of human rights violations: army violence, prohibition from travel, arrests, expropriation of property etc. There are about seventy prisoners from Abu Dis in Israeli jails and about a third of them are children.

The very worst individual violations were the following:

- In September, Maryam Ayyad (aged 58) was killed during an invasion into her house by Israeli soldiers. CADFA organised a protest vigil and later a memorial for Maryam.
- In December, Mohammed Eriqat (aged 17) was shot and seriously wounded by Israeli soldiers, who later extracted a confession from him on his hospital bed and took him CADFA raised this with our MEPs who were able to raise it at the European Union level, and this appears to have helped to gain his parents the right to visit him in hospital – though he was later taken to prison from the hospital.
- Also in December, Hamam Mohsen (aged 17) was shot in the back of the head by Israeli soldiers, and was for some time in a coma and in a dangerous condition. We are very pleased to say that he seems determined to get better, although he is still unable to move his right side and his speech is badly affected.

These violations were part of a systematic pressure on the Palestinians that is making it very hard for them to live a normal life. CADFA has written to the Israeli authorities about a number of the violations but the typical response is no answer. The army beatings of boys in the Abu Dis Boys' School in 2007 were raised to the level of an enquiry, but the enquiry was then abandoned.

Gaza

In December 08 to January 09, the Israelis conducted a terrifying war on the people of the Gaza Strip. Along with the UN and other agencies, CADFA has called for urgent investigation and prosecution for war crimes, and has drawn attention to this in a number of ways: the music visit to Britain in February, "die-ins" in Camden, letters to MPs and MEPs, organising petition letters from audiences at talks across the country during the women's visit to be given both to the British government and the European Union.

Expansion of settlements and Judaisation of Jerusalem.

At the time that the world's attention was drawn to Gaza, Israel's land expropriations and settlement-building around Jerusalem, and the pressure on Palestinians to leave Jerusalem have been escalating. The people of Abu Dis suffer badly from this. CADFA has attempted to raise the local awareness of the importance of this issue through public meetings and the publication of a leaflet on the issue.

The EU Israel Trade Agreement

Action needs to be taken to prevent these systematic violations of human rights. CADFA has spoken to local MPs and MEPs about Article 2 of the EU-Israel Trade Agreement which should ensure that parties to the agreement respect human rights and has organised letter-writing on this subject. We believe that suspension of the Trade Agreement until the Palestinians' human rights are protected could provide an effective sanction.

This is to vouch for the work of Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association which has been in existence for four years, and in that space of time has made itself into a very useful support for the human rights of the Palestinian people.

Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association have shown the effectiveness of twinning with Palestine as a way of campaigning for Palestinian rights. It has worked energetically at a local level to bring information to Britain about the situation of the Palestinian people, and has developed a new model which is proving to be effective.

Part of its work has been to organise many effective visits of people from Abu Dis to Britain during the past three years - this has included three groups of children, three groups of women and several other visits. These visitors meet people at the grassroot level in Britain, speak in schools and universities and other organisations to thousands of people, and together with speakers from CADFA who demonstrated the success of their work, persuaded many new people to become active on the issue of Palestine.

Camden Abu Dis also runs regular themed tours of Palestine to witness the situation on the ground. They work widely with all sorts of organizations to bring information and encourage the participation of people in Britain to work for Palestinian rights. Their Education Links is particularly inspiring - they have encouraged two pairs of schools to twin, others to make links, and organized visits of groups of teachers in both directions. For example, following a trip to Palestine that Camden Abu Dis organised for Camden students, Camden school students organized assemblies on the issue of Palestine, and posted information on their website.

Camden Abu Dis has a very useful website - www.camdenabudis.net - and it has produced a number of publications, including "The First Six Days" - published in 2007 - an oral history of 1967 from an Abu Dis point of view, and "Voices from Abu Dis" - forthcoming in autumn 2008 - telling the Palestinian narrative through individual human stories. It started a campaign about the issue of Palestinian children prisoners

Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association has worked on joint projects with people in Palestine – supporting a community centre, a women's group, a music teacher, internet in schools and a small clinic. It works with a wide range of organizations in Palestine and produces a human rights report about Abu Dis in English and Arabic each month, thus outlining the human rights violations by Israel.

Camden Abu Dis is also a main engine within the Britain Palestine Twinning Network, which started as a result of a conference in Camden in September 2005. This growing twinning movement now has some thirty partnerships, and Camden Abu Dis has done a lot to further this movement and to support other groups. It currently organizes further visits between the two communities on behalf of the network and it is committed to sharing its strong experience with other groups and to helping other twinning friendships to form.

We are very keen to support the work of Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association, which has been successful in involving and raising awareness among the British people to think and contribute towards the ending of Palestinian suffering. Its work is extremely valuable and welcomed. We invite you to support Camden Abu Dis Friendship Association in every way possible.
